Module 1: Laying the Groundwork for an Inclusive Environment
A. The Compelling History of Inclusion: A Blueprint for Success

"I touch the future; I teach." Christa McAu-

liffe told her peers as she coaxed them out of isolation to embrace new ways of thinking about at-risk children. Dr. Cathy Hamilton presents the history of inclusion, tracing its roots from mainstream legislation in the 1970s to the realities of integrated inclusion we find in today's classroom. B. Creating a Safe and Welcoming Environment
